September 4th—Labor Day

The origins of Labor Day can be traced back to the labor union movement of the late 19th century, when industrial workers sought better working conditions, fair wages and reasonable hours. Labor Day became an official federal holiday in 1894 under President Grover Cleveland. In America, Labor Day is observed on the first Monday in September. As a tribute to the resilience and determination of American workers, Labor Day remains an important nations observance symbolizing appreciation for the labor force that drives the nation's progress and prosperity.

Be Careful, Be Safe, Be Aware

Now that school is back in session children of all ages need to be aware of their surroundings, walking to and from school and of strangers lurking about.

Here are some tips to follow that might help you get to school and back home safely:

Be Careful

- Walk in groups.
- Follow the instructions of the crossing guards. They make sure that you cross the streets carefully.
- Stay off your cell phone when going to and from school, you need to pay attention to traffic and your surroundings
- Do not wear your headsets while walking to school you need to be able to hear noises behind and around you.
- Do not walk close to the road, always walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, walk facing the traffic.
- Avoid crossing between cars.

Be Safe

- Avoid all strangers, do not accept rides
- If you feel that you are being followed run to a neighbors house and have them call 911.
- If you are riding the school bus and there is no one at the bus stop to pick you up let the driver know.
- Make sure that you stay in the area designated for children during the schools after school program.
- Never wonder off school premises

Be Aware

- If you are a latch key kid make sure that no one is following you home from school.
- Be aware of your surroundings and of strangers
- Be aware when crossing the streets. Look in all directions, and watch for turning vehicles.
